Meet Our Interim Minister

The Board of Directors is delighted to announce that Don Rollins will be our interim minister. The Board voted unanimously to accept the recommendation of the Interim Search Committee that Don be the interim minister, and he begins work on September 1.

He has been a UU minister since 1987, serving UU congregations as a settled parish minister and as an interim minister. In the late 1990s Don left the ministry to be a classroom teacher and social worker. In 2002 he returned to active ministry. Don is coming to us from Minnesota Valley UU Fellowship in Bloomington, MN, where he served as interim minister for one year.

In his resumé Don tells us that he was raised in far southern Ohio, an area of the state much more akin to Appalachia than the Midwest. That culture gave him a deep appreciation of simplicity, music, and nature—as well as the capacity to "make do" in tough times.

Seminary gave Don a forum for his quest and a language for his mightiest theological struggle to date. He entered a Methodist layperson and exited a Unitarian Universalist minister.

During his seminary training time he worked as director of religious education at the First UU Church of Columbus, Ohio. His work experience also includes being an assistant director at the UU summer camp Unirondack, among other things.

Don likes to cast a wide net in his methods of serving a congregation: preacher and worship leader, storyteller, musician, poet, comedian, pastor, administrator, teacher, and consultant.

Don highly values the performing arts, especially music. He describes himself as a folk musician/songwriter, but listens to and appreciates a wide variety of styles. One of his proudest experiences in ministry occurred when one of the congregations he was serving featured a multi-ethnic grunge band on Saturday night and the church choir sang in high-church German on Sunday morning.

For Don, the arts, visual and performing, are central to

meaningful worship and attracting new folks. He uses the guitar in some worship services.

Don identifies himself as a religious humanist, but he is by no means opposed to the use of “God-talk” to express one’s personal encounter with life and mystery. Don states he has no agenda about his own theology other than to hone, live, and deepen it.

Don states in his resumé, “I know of no UU theologies with which I have a quarrel. I am active in empowering and serving rationalists as well as spiritualists, UU Pagans as well as UU Christians. For me, the point is to be engaged in becoming the best humanist, pagan, theist, etc., possible.”

Don also says, “In terms of a sense of call, I can say that no vocation allows me to engage more of my interests, experience, and self than our ministry. I am most centered and alive when serving a UU congregation; ministry calls for my best, not just as a religious professional but also as a religious human being. I’m grateful for my time spent in education and social work, but am happy with the decision to return to ministry in 2002.”

Don is single and in a committed relationship. Rebecca is a licensed, private-practice psychotherapist in the Twin Cities.

We are very pleased to have Don joining us in the fall and look forward to a rewarding year together.

UUCS Board Minutes

June 16, 2009

The Board unanimously approved the candidate recommended by the Interim Minister Search Committee (IMSC) after a presentation by committee chair David Stack. Donald Rollins is a long-time UU minister, ordained in 1987 and currently serving as interim parish minister at Minnesota Valley UU Fellowship. Pending contract negotiations, he will begin at UUCS under a one-year renewable contract in September.

Approximately twenty-five congregants attended the meeting. Those who served on the IMSC were David Stack, chair; Grace Jerome, youth rep; Sally McClellan, Worship Committee rep; Bernie Kakuske and Deana Kloster, congregational reps. The committee, formed soon after Meg's Mothers Day resignation announcement, met several times to educate themselves about the process, formulate questions, and review ministerial packets. The UUA initially sent four names. Two of those candidates dropped out for personal reasons and the UUA sent two more names, so the committee again had four viable candidates, David said. One of the four was eliminated due to lack of experience. Of the three remaining candidates, the committee chose Rollins.

References were checked, David said. Comments from two presidents and a board chairman of two churches (one in Ohio and one in Minnesota) where Rollins served were highly favorable. (For more details, please see the informational packet posted on the church business bulletin board and read the write-up in this issue of the *Unison*.)

A negotiating team will negotiate salary, compensation, and other contractual matter. Those members are Charlie Mierek, Kim Danner, and Karen Mitchell, who had their initial meeting immediately following the Board meeting.

In other business, treasurer Ben Harris said May was a good month with a profit of \$3,927. May was a five-Sunday month. The \$3,943 received from the Assault on Mount Mitchell and Spring Fling fundraisers came at a good time as April was a very lean month. A \$10,000 line of credit was obtained from Arthur State Bank. As yet, we have not had to use it. Several members have made advance payments on their 2009-10 pledges, totaling \$3,250. Checks totaling \$2,731 were written on behalf of four local charities—Bethlehem Center, New Day Clubhouse, Park Hills, and Piedmont Care.

Ed Wilde was elected by the board to be our delegate at General Assembly.

STEWARDSHIP/CANVASS CAMPAIGN RESULTS FOR 2009/2010

As of June 22nd, 120 pledges had been received with financial commitments totaling \$142,162. This is ninety-eight percent of our budgeted pledge-income goal of \$145,000, so we're almost there—thanks to the generosity of our members and friends who have been willing to give their financial "commitment" in support of UUCS's mission, programs, and ministries.
