Same with health care reform. Iraq. Afghanistan. A fit-and-start economy. And, if all this is not enough to bum you out, just pick up most any newspaper or check out most online news sources. It's a rough old world.

The new UUUCS mission statement should be taking final shape by the time you receive this month's *Unison*. As you may know by now, three core values are identified therein: religious freedom; caring community; and social justice. The idea is to move from the individual, to the local congregation, to the outside world. It's about deepening one's spirituality while making contact with real-time people trying to make a dent in real-time injustice and suffering.

Community is in short supply. Life is always tough for somebody, somewhere; thus the opening line "In times like these..." can be universally applied across the generations. I don't know where our current world ranks in the great panoply of human and planetary indignities, but I know that genuine community can dispel gloom and sustain souls in tough times. And I know that community isn't listed in the mission statement by accident.

So, in times like these, know that you have a part in the storm of negativity: Unitarian Universalist Church of Spartanburg. It was begun in hope, nurtured through stewardship and stands today as a counterpoint to despair. Keep the faith. Be the faith. Share the faith.

Letter from the President

Some things that are happening at the UU—

Have you opened the door to the stairwell to the lower level and walked down the stairs? Have you walked through the downstairs to the far right door and walked into our new classroom? While you were downstairs did you look at the new shelves that will house all our “stuff”?

If you have, you know how different it feels and looks. Thank you to all the church people who made it happen. Your Board designated \$1,000 from a gift given by Greg Lynch’s daughters to our congregation to buy supplies to help us get the downstairs more usable and better looking. We can make improvements, bit by bit, and now I encourage you to use the newly redone space.

There was a congregational meeting in January. Approval was given to amend our by-laws to require that one must give a financial contribution of record in order to be a member. That means a member must give some amount (there is no minimum nor maximum) that we know came from that member.

While people were gathered together we had a discussion about a draft mission statement. The Board will take all those ideas and work on the mission statement some more. We also took the opportunity to tell folks about changes coming in the way we decide on social justice issues. More on both of these items will be forthcoming.

At the January Board meeting your Board members considered the question, What do we want our church to be like in one year or eighteen months? It is the Board’s responsibility not only to oversee this year’s work, but also to think about our future. We continue to work towards a strong future for our congregation.

Local Member Honored

Mary Miles has been appointed by the Unitarian Universalist Association Board of Trustees to serve on one of four UU Funding Program (UUF) panels. The UUF is a denominational grant-making program of the UUA, and the one to which Mary has been appointed (the Fund for Unitarian Universalism) makes grants to strengthen UU institutions and community life. In fact, UUCS received a \$7,500 grant from this fund in 2006 to do “The Parable Project,” intended to promote creative generosity in the congregation. Although the project did not turn out to be as successful as we’d hoped, it was, as Meg said at the time, “quite an honor for our church to have been given this grant.”

Maybe Low setting for gentle daily use with the folks that cross our paths and the regular stuff that happens, Medium for annoying and tedious people and situations that tend to recur, and High for the people and problems that drive us crazy. And then maybe there could be Ultra-High or PowerBurst setting for people and situations that are really dangerous and/or tragic. Use of the Love-saber causes the target to become radiant and beloved, dissolves conflict so that everyone wins, and transforms not only the target, but the one who wields the Love. Guaranteed. I can't wait to try it out.

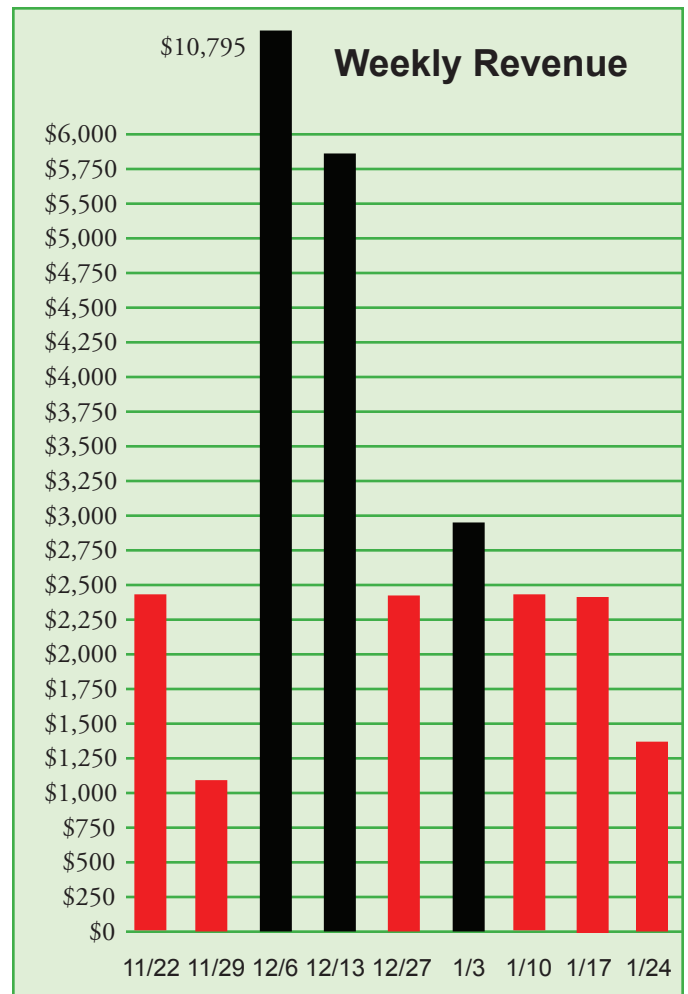

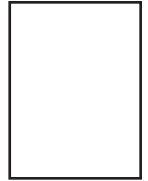
